This term's CGG Lecture Series is dedicated to issues and questions of „Global Environmental Governance“. Growing public concern for global environmental changes has brought the problem of global political coordination to the fore. Current social sciences start from the assumption of a risk society, with ecological effects that can be observed on a global scale. Anthropogenic climate change in particular raises the question of how societal transformations can contribute to a less carbonised society, given that the global environmental governance has to be achieved in a world without global government, and under the conditions of extreme social and geopolitical inequalities.

The Lecture Series is organized in collaboration with the Cluster of Excellence 'Integrated Climate System Analysis and Prediction' (CliSAP). The program addresses a broad audience inside and outside of the University of Hamburg, and presents recent research results from the social sciences. Topics of the Lecture will be: ecological orders of justification, diplomacy as a tool to achieve sustainable development, the contribution of global carbon markets to climate protection, the relevance of science for global environmental governance, the role of non-governmental actors and the political economy of climate change. Most of the lectures will be held in English.
